Celebrate the Moon Festival at home with Maribyrnong Libraries!

The Mid-Autumn Moon Festival is celebrated every year by many countries in Asia. It follows the lunar calendar and falls in the middle of Autumn in countries like China, Vietnam, Singapore, Malaysia, Korea and Japan (but for us in Australia, it's in the middle of Spring). Known as 中秋節 (in China) or **Tết Trung Thu** (in Vietnam), it is also related to Chuseok (in Korea) and Tsukimi (in Japan). This year it falls on 1 October.

The festival traditionally celebrates the gathering of friends and family, good harvesting of crops and thanksgiving and good fortune during the time when the moon is the fullest and most beautiful.

For some festive cheer while being stuck at home this Moon Festival, Maribyrnong Libraries has this helpful guide to celebrating at home!





Mooncakes Galore!

Mooncakes are a specialty eaten during the Moon Festival, they are dense cakes filled with a variety of fillings. Some popular fillings are lotus bean, nuts, and even durian! You can get them with a salted egg inside or without. It's all enveloped in a tender pastry pressed with intricate designs or words of well wishes. 
lantern outer body


