# PETITION: WESTGATE BASKETBALL NEEDS YOUR SUPPORT FOR A NEW STADIUM IN YARRAVILLE!

### PURPOSE

To table a petition received in relation to "Petition: Westgate Basketball Needs Your Support for a New Stadium in Yarraville".

### **ISSUES SUMMARY**

- A petition has been submitted to Council containing 2209 signatures.
- The petition presented to Council included the following text:

# To Maribyrnong City Council:

Westgate Basketball needs your support for a new stadium in Yarraville! In just over 10 years Westgate's youth basketball competition has gone from a handful of teams playing on four courts for half a day at the Whitten Community Sport Stadium to now over 190 teams playing across 14 courts at three indoor stadiums in Maribyrnong. We've grown from a first season with about 200 members to now nearly 3,000 players, coaches, referees and volunteers.

While participation in the sport has grown exponentially, the number of accessible courts in Maribyrnong for competition has not grown. As a result, our competitions and programs are currently at capacity and our local clubs have lengthy waiting lists. Most at risk is provision for programs and competitions for younger participants as we've had to limit the number of introductory program and we are unable to introduce an Under 8 competition for our youngest players.

A recent study by Maribyrnong Council suggested that by 2036 between 4 and 12 indoor courts will be required to meet demand for indoor sports such as volleyball, netball, futsal, and basketball. 










































#### MCIVOR RESERVE DRAFT MASTER PLAN

#### PURPOSE

Council to consider adoption of the McIvor Reserve Master Plan following community feedback on the draft Master Plan.

#### **ISSUES SUMMARY**

- In 2021 Council commenced a process to develop a Master Plan for McIvor Reserve that reflects both the current and future needs and demands of both the tenant sporting clubs and broader community users of the Reserve.
- At its Meeting on 15 November 2022 Council endorsed a report recommendation to publicly advertise the McIvor Reserve Draft Master Plan and seek feedback on the plan.
- Engagement on the Draft Master Plan occurred over eight weeks from November 2022 to January 2023, during which time there was a high level of community interest.
- The most recent engagement followed the initial engagement phase that occurred from April 2021 to August 2022.
- Feedback was gathered from a range of sources including an online comments tool, survey (both online and hard copy), in-person sessions, and written correspondence.
- Respondents were asked to provide feedback to a range of proposed developments across the four key categories of sports, open space, amenities, and parking and traffic.
- The feedback from all sources has resulted in additional Master Plan actions and revisions to the draft master plan outlined in the body of this report.
- The McIvor Reserve Master Plan is now ready for Council consideration.

#### OFFICER RECOMMENDATION

That Council:

- 1. Note the feedback received from a range of sources on the Draft McIvor Reserve Master Plan.
- 2. Adopts the McIvor Reserve Master Plan 2023 and authorises the commencement of;
  - a. Schematic design and necessary site planning and due diligence to enable upgrades to the Reserve including the provision of an Indoor Sports Facility
  - b. Advocate for State and Federal funding to support implementation of the Master Plan

# BACKGROUND

McIvor Reserve is a Municipal open space that covers an area of approximately 18.5 hectares in Yarraville. It is bordered by Francis St to the north, Fogarty Avenue to the south, the former Bradmill site to the west and residential properties in Hawkhurst St, Wembley Avenue, Benbow St and Mill Avenue to the east.

As a large recreation reserve it caters for structured club based sport and informal recreation use within Maribyrnong's existing open space network. It accommodates a number of sporting facilities that service a regional catchment such as hockey and baseball whilst also providing facilities for cricket, Australian Rules football, lawn bowls and soccer.

In addition to the facilities for sporting club use, the reserve supports a range of informal activities and includes infrastructure such as a playground, a fully fenced dog off-lead area, and a circuit path around the sports fields. The sports fields also provide a significant area of open space for passive recreation outside of sports bookings and are well utilised by the community for a variety of pursuits from dog walking to fitness training.

In 2021 Council commenced the process of developing a new Master Plan for McIvor Reserve. The objectives of the project were:

1. To develop a master plan that reflects both the current and future needs and demands of both the sporting clubs and other users at the Reserve based on research and consultation undertaken.

2. To develop a long term strategic direction for the future development of McIvor Reserve, ensuring the Reserve is a welcoming and inclusive place which brings people together and strengthens community connections.

The principles underpinning the development of the draft Master Plan included:

- Meeting and responding to changing participation trends, community needs and demands
- Consolidating assets for more efficient and cost-effective management and utilisation
- Creating facilities which are fit for purpose and meet contemporary compliance guidelines
- Providing public spaces are that safe and accessible for all ages
- Improving facilities while maintaining local amenity
- Provide for a variety of open space uses
- Improving community wellbeing and encourage healthy active lifestyles
- Encouraging active and sustainable transport modes
- Ensuring net green space is maximised and impact of trees is minimised

On 15 November 2022 Council considered a report on the McIvor Reserve Draft Master Plan and resolved to:

1. Note the significant community interest in the McIvor Reserve Master Plan.

2. Approve the release of the draft McIvor Reserve Master Plan for community comment that includes the provision of an indoor sports centre with up to six courts located at the northern end of the reserve.

3. Requests a further report on the final McIvor Reserve Master Plan in March 2023.

The outcomes of the recent engagement are outlined in the body of this report with a list of responses and recommendations.

# **DISCUSSION/KEY ISSUES**

#### 1. Key Issues

#### **Community Engagement**

#### a) Engagement Approach

The draft Master Plan was publically advertised over a period of eight weeks from November 2022 to January 2023 whereby the community was invited to provide feedback. This included a four week engagement period prior to Christmas and extended engagement over the holiday period to support those who may not have been able to provide feedback beforehand, to also share their comments.

Engagement was premised on seeking community feedback on the more than two dozen proposed upgrades to McIvor Reserve that were broadly categorised into four key areas.

Engagement was designed to understand community sentiment around the proposed actions in the master plan but was not a vote on each of these actions.

Engagement did not seek to gather support or opposition towards an indoor sports facility at McIvor Reserve specifically. However it has tended to dominate the conversation and negatively influence the feedback on the Master Plan generally.

Table 1 provides a summary of the community reach during this phase of engagement.

A petition was also received by Council on 14 February 2023 requesting the Council not build an indoor sports stadium or associated car park on McIvor Reserve or any other green open space in the city. This petition has been considered.

Of the 3102 signatures to the petition, 933 could be identified as being residents of the City of Maribyrnong.

#### b) Responses and Findings

During this engagement phase respondents were asked to provide feedback on the more than two dozen proposed upgrades generally, and separately across the four key categories:

- Sports upgrades
- Open Space
- Amenities
- Parking and Traffic

Across all engagement activities a total of 4,017 comments were received from 753 respondents made up of:

- 394 surveys (from 351 contributors)
- 1,657 comments on the virtual post-it boards (noting that more than one third came from 10 individual posters largely in opposition to the draft Master Plan)
- Eight hard copy surveys
- 275 comments from 65 attendees at in-person sessions
- 22 pieces of written correspondence (*from a mix of individuals and representatives of sporting groups and organisations on behalf of their several thousand members*)

Many aspects of the draft Master Plan were well received, particularly on the need for public toilets, more activation spaces (such as the outdoor gym and linear path), more lighting, shade, seating, and improved drainage for the dog park and sports fields.

There were general themes to minimise impact on green space and protection of trees, and a desire to better understand any impacts to parking and traffic potentially generated by the proposed additional use.

Overall much of the feedback centred around the support or otherwise for the inclusion of an Indoor Sports Facility on the Reserve.

There was general acknowledgement of the need for a new Indoor Sports Facility within the municipality - but there are ongoing concerns around impacts on the local environment if one was to be built at McIvor Reserve.

Green space and tree loss along with the impact on the existing dog park were the main issues raised, with traffic and other concerns associated with an increased use of the Reserve specifically flagged by close neighbours during face-to face sessions.

The majority of the concerns and opposition came from respondents who identified largely as neighbours, Yarraville residents and dog walkers, who were most critical of the draft Master Plan generally and continued to oppose any departure from the status quo.

Conversely there were also comments expressing gratitude, relief and excitement at the release of the draft Master Plan and the prospect of including a six-court indoor sports facility, given the existing shortfall and growing pressure this is placing on clubs.

Those in support generally interpreted the inclusion of an indoor sports facility at McIvor Reserve as an upgrade that would benefit the whole community - by improving social connection and cohesion, increasing health and wellbeing, and providing a critical outlet for young people.

# **Proposed Revisions to the Master Plans**

Where through this process the community has identified specific concerns, officers have looked to address those with the changes that have been made to the draft Master Plan.

The changes and revisions have been made with consideration to the feedback received, technical investigations and specialist advice, and aligning with the planning principles outlined above.

Alignment with the planning principles combined with;

- A severe shortage of indoor courts within the Municipality
- McIvor Reserve being zoned for the type of recreation use proposed and;
- The location of McIvor Reserve to meet an identified gap in our City,

suggests the Master Plan including a new indoor sports facility is a balanced outcome responding to a variety of community needs.

The revised Master Plan is provided in Attachment 1.

The suggested amendments are responded to in Attachment 2 and are also summarised as follows in line with the four key categories.

# a) Sports Upgrades

This category was designed to understand community views around a number of proposed upgrades. However feedback was largely focused on the potential for the development of an indoor sports facility at the Reserve.

Whilst there is a portion of the community that opposes the inclusion of an Indoor Sports Facility at McIvor Reserve, there is also a portion of the community that supports the inclusion of the facility.

Whilst acknowledging the opposition, there is enough support to suggest that on balance and with consideration for Council's strategic objectives, the proposal for an Indoor Sports Facility being developed at McIvor Reserve should proceed.

The engagement identified the main concerns regarding the inclusion of an Indoor Facility at McIvor Reserve were:

- i. Loss of green space
- ii. Loss of mature trees
- iii. Impact of traffic in local streets
- iv. Impact on the dog park

The revised Masterplan responds to this in the following ways:

- Loss of green space the building footprint of the Facility will be positioned partially on the existing Hawkhurst St car park to minimise impact on green space. The remainder of the building including the vehicle drop-off zone will occupy approximately 0.6HA of open space which represents 3.3% of the entire 18.5 hectares that makes up McIvor Reserve.
- ii. Loss of mature trees the footprint of the Indoor Sports Facility is estimated to impact 81 trees including 31 trees that have been assessed as having a low arboricultural rating and only one that has a high rating. It is estimated that a further 33 trees will be impacted by other changes within the reserve including 10 trees of Low or Very Low value and only one with a High value rating. The Arboricultural Assessment will inform the design process during the implementation of each stage of the master plan and opportunities to further reduce the impact on existing trees will be explored. The draft Master Plan proposes a minimum net increase of 114 trees to the current number of trees at the Reserve.
- iii. <u>Impact of traffic on local streets</u> a qualitative first-principles assessment of parking and traffic impacts associated with the proposed Master Plan suggests that the overall car parking supply within the reserve is likely to be more than adequate to serve the likely peak parking needs of the new indoor sports facility and open sports fields, and any increased traffic in surrounding streets is likely to be absorbed without any major operational and safety implications.

A large proportion of traffic generated by the indoor sports facility, open sports fields and soccer field would access the reserve via the new McIvor Road and its intersection with Francis Street, which is to be signalised as part of the Bradmill development.

iv. <u>Impact on the dog park</u> – with the inclusion of an Indoor Sports Facility in the proposed location it is unavoidable to impact the existing fenced dog off-lead area to some degree. While the enclosed area will be reduced by 17.6% to an approximate area of 7500sqm, the remaining area will be reconstructed and upgraded with new features including but not limited to new grass, drainage and irrigation, dog agility elements, water fountains, shade, and located in close proximity to public toilets. Input will be sought from the current users through the design development.

To offset the loss of approximately 1600sqm from the existing enclosed dog offlead area an additional 6,000sqm of open space outside the new outfield fence on the baseball field will be designated as an off-lead dog area. While not being designated as an enclosed dog park, this newly developed linear bushland area will provide an alternative experience as a dog off lead space.

When considering development of the new dog park, combined with the current sports fields being designated as off-lead areas when not in use for sport, and significant off-lead space at nearby Cruikshank Park, residents with dogs are considered to be well catered for in this part of the City.

# Other Sports Upgrades

Outside of expressing support or opposition for an Indoor Sports Facility, comments on the proposed sports facility upgrades generally originated predominantly from tenant clubs and users.

The key revisions to the draft plan in response to feedback include:

- A reduction of the Indoor Sports Facility building footprint to remain outside the area leased to the Yarraville Footscray Bowls Club, as the Club did not support merging its facility as part of the proposed new building. The redevelopment of the bowls clubroom and the conversion of one green to a synthetic surface under a canopy have been removed from the master plan.
- The baseball diamond will not be moved 5-10 metres north and will be able to remain in its current location as the addition of 90-degree parking on the northern side of Benbow St has been removed. Upgrades to the playing field, dugouts and scorers box have been included.
- The upgrade of floodlights at the hockey centre to senior competition standard has been added.
- New soccer goal storage compound opening to the main pitch and the open sports field area has been relocated.
- The open sports field area shows the most common layout of the sportsgrounds in winter and includes two junior football ovals, two full size soccer pitches and one small soccer pitch. An alternative layout makes provision for a single full size oval without reducing the number of soccer pitches that would be available.

# b) Open Space Provision

The Open Space category asked respondents for their thoughts on the proposed changes and enhancements to the fenced dog off-lead area, sports fields and general open space at McIvor Reserve.

The key revisions to the draft plan in response to that feedback include:

- Removing the fence at the rear of the baseball batting cage and at the Benbow St end of the new linear bushland trail so that this area remains a through-way, responding to adjacent resident concerns of a fully fenced dog park. Improvement to the space will include a new path, turf, landscaping, irrigation and drainage making it a more useable and accessible piece of open space.
- A reduction in the estimated number of trees to be impacted by the implementation of the master plan from 163 to 114 and a commitment to plant a minimum of two trees for every tree that is removed.
- Reduction in the size of the Indoor Sports Facility building footprint by creating a second story for off-court facilities that do not need to be at court level, and by doing so preventing further impact on open space.

#### c) Improved Amenities

The Amenities category asked respondents what they thought of the proposed upgrades to general amenities at McIvor Reserve including public toilets, seating, lighting, shelter and the playspace.

The key revisions to the draft plan in response include:

- Retaining the playground in its existing location so that it is not separated from the open sports field area by a car park.
- Committing to further consultation with the community on the design and inclusions for an upgraded enclosed dog off-lead area.
- Repositioning the entry point to the indoor sports facility to reduce the impact on the existing dog park.
- Provision for more trees, park benches and shade shelters within the reserve.

# d) Parking and Traffic Management

Key revisions to the draft plan in response to feedback on specific parking and traffic issues includes:

- Confirmation of the addition of a signalised intersection and pedestrian crossing at the intersection of Francis St, Roberts St and the new McIvor Rd.
- Connecting the shared path network from the signalised intersection in the north western corner of the reserve to Fogarty Avenue and the Federation Trail in the south-eastern corner of the reserve.
- Removing the proposal to create carparking on the northern side of Benbow St.
- The parking adjacent to the existing pavilion will remain unchanged until such time as the design for a new pavilion determines any need for that space.

- Removing the extension of the Hawkhurst St carpark to avoid encroaching further into the reserve and triggering further impact on existing trees.
- Formalising the connection between the soccer club carpark and the hockey club carpark.
- Acknowledgement of the availability of overflow event parking along the western side of Gent St if it is ever required.
- Consideration for water sensitive urban design features in all carparks to improve the quality of stormwater entering Stony Creek.

#### 3. Engagement

Two phases of engagement have been undertaken over a ten month period between May 2022 and February 2023.

A variety of tools and methods have been deployed to support community participation in the engagement across both phases including: online surveys and virtual post-it boards, digital question and answer tool, in-person information sessions, a webinar, and written correspondence.

The majority of feedback across both phases has been captured using Council's digital engagement portal, Your City Your Voice, which, during the two phases of engagement has attracted more than 20,000 views of the project from just under 7,000 unique visitors (3,183 in Phase 1 and 3,057 in Phase 2).

While the numbers of unique visitors are on a par across both phases, the number of respondents actively engaging and providing feedback during Phase 2 was significantly reduced (by a third) comparative to Phase 1.

This appears to reflect a shift in interest from the broader community generally to those with a more direct link to the Reserve i.e. residents, neighbours, dog walkers, sports users and potential future users.

During phase one, a total of 1,143 surveys were completed and 135 questions answered online, 130 residents attended an online community forum, and there were in person conversations with around 100 attendees at the Reserve, over 70 days of engagement. In addition there were three letterbox deliveries to 2,400 near neighbours. 74% of online respondents identified as living in Yarraville.

A total of 4,017 comments were received during phase 2 from 753 respondents across all engagement activities. Demographics were only captured for the survey where 66% of the survey respondents identified as an immediate neighbour, Yarraville resident or dog walker.

The addition of the Visioner Post-It Tool for feedback during the second phase provided opportunity for respondents to return multiple times to view and respond to new comments. More than 30% of the 1,657 posts and associated comments were made by 10 posters, who were also responsible for 30 of the 394 survey responses.

Recognising Phase 2 engagement was premised on 'sentiment' as opposed to 'votes' an independent Analysis Assistant (AA) tool was used to analyse the qualitative responses. This tool automatically processes large volumes of unstructured data, identifying the sentiment and key phrases of responses. Further, 'bulk tagging' was utilised to assign themes and topics as a means of extracting key messages.

# 4. Resources

A conservative preliminary Quantity Survey estimates a budget of approximately \$58M to implement the McIvor Reserve Master Plan in its entirety.

This includes the Indoor Sports Facility which is estimated to cost approximately \$36M to develop inclusive of public toilets to service the dog park, sports grounds and general park users, vehicle drop off zone, and universal change rooms and amenities to service the sports grounds.

It is anticipated significant external State and Federal Government funding is required along with Council contribution to enable delivery of the plan.

### 5. Environment

The McIvor Reserve Master Plan seeks to minimise environmental impact. A detailed Arboricultural Assessment has been completed and an arboricultural value has been assigned to all 625 trees within the reserve as part of that assessment. The detailed design process will aim to minimise the impact on all trees and particularly those with a high or moderate rating. During construction trees will be protected and any tree that is removed will be replaced with a minimum of two trees elsewhere within the reserve. Where appropriate, like for like species replacement will be the preference along with selecting species to enhance habitat, climate suitability and canopy resilience.

An Ecological Biodiversity Assessment is taking place to confirm flora, fauna and habitat within the site. Evidence of bird nesting (physical nests and nesting behaviour) have been identified in twelve trees within the reserve to date. Any assessment findings will be followed with a detailed Fauna Management Plan to protect fauna species and minimise disturbance during construction and after project completion. Revegetation will support fauna species identified in the assessment through flora species selection and habitat recreation.

The design, construction and future operation of the indoor sports centre, soccer pavilion and in time the new shared-use pavilion will be guided by Council's Environmental Sustainable Design Policy for Council Buildings. Water sensitive urban design features will be considered in the detailed design process for all buildings and carparks, and opportunities to reuse water on-site and improve the quality of stormwater entering Stony Creek will be explored.

# CONCLUSION

The overarching purpose of the McIvor Reserve Master Plan was to develop a long term plan that reflects the current and future recreational needs of a growing population.

It provides a clear strategic direction and enables Council to advocate for funding support to implement the multiple actions required to service the community and provide for a variety of recreation pursuits.

An extensive and thorough engagement process was undertaken over a ten month period collecting a wealth of feedback used to inform the development of the plan.

McIvor Reserve is a significantly sized regional space that currently supports a variety of uses, and, with effective planning has the potential to meet the range of recreation needs for a growing population expected to reach 155,000 residents by 2051.

Where specific concerns were raised, officers have responded in a fair and equitable manner, providing a balanced Master Plan that meets the variety of needs expressed throughout the engagement process.

The plans are now ready for Councils consideration.
