	Welcome and Acknowledgement of Country
1	The Chair, Martina Holland opened the meeting by acknowledging the Traditional Owners of the lands, the Wurundjeri and Bunurong People of the Kulin Nation.

	The Chair also acknowledged it has been one year since the passing of Cr Sarah Carter and highlighted her impact within the community.
2	Conflict of interest declaration and endorsement of previous minutes No conflicts were declared. The minutes from the June 2025 CRC meeting were endorsed by members.
3	Action item overview The Chair provided an overview of the action items. This can be found on pages 6-7.
4	Google Flood Hub (Paul Larsen) Community representative, Paul Larsen, advised that a local resident built an app which tracks river gauge data and maps this in comparison to the month leading up to the 2022 flood. This resident's goal is for the app to be embedded into Google Flood Hub, however permission is required from Melbourne Water to utilise their data for this. Paul advised that Melbourne Water has declined permission for this to take place and questioned whether a representative from Melbourne Water could attend an upcoming meeting to hear from the CRC about the benefits of the app. Action: Council to invite a Melbourne Water representative to an upcoming CRC meeting to discuss the Google Flood Hub proposal
5	CRC Project Level of Influence (Andrew Monteiro) Community representative, Andrew Monteiro was an apology so this item was deferred for a future meeting.
	Flood Recovery Program The Chair provided the following updates on the Flood Recovery Program:
6	WestJustice and Community Worker pop-up clinic <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Council is trialling a weekly insurance support pop-up clinic with WestJustice at the Maribyrnong Community Centre. This will provide support to residents with: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ○ Insurance (disputes about insurers' decisions, cash settlement decisions, or conduct of assessors of repairers) ○ Debt, credit, or money issues ○ Renting issues ○ Fines and infringement issues ○ Motor vehicle accidents • Council social worker will also be available for walk-in support on a weekly basis from tomorrow for a six week trial

Property flood risk cards

- The final version of the property flood risk cards were presented to members. Feedback from the CRC and Maribyrnong Community Recovery Association has been reflected in this version.
- A doorknock will take place in the last week of August and first week of September to distribute the cards to each property as well as a fridge magnet and supporting information.
- Cr Susan Yengi asked if there will be additional opportunities to receive the cards and ask questions. The Flood Recovery Manager advised there will be an opportunity to book a 1:1 appointment or small group session to receive the cards and ask further questions for those unavailable during the door knock. A barbeque will also be held in September to officially launch the cards and ask questions.
- Cr Yengi requested a briefing on how to read the cards.

Action: Council to invite the CRC and Maribyrnong Neighbourhood Flood Network to a small group session on interpreting the property flood risk cards

Anniversary event planning

- Moonee Valley expressed interest in partnering with Maribyrnong CRC to deliver the anniversary event at Coulson Gardens scheduled for 11 October. Members indicated support for this request.
- It was noted that the event will involve a launch of the public artwork, screening of the audio-visual community stories series, as well as live performances from local musicians. It will also feature food trucks and free activities.
- The Chair asked if any members would be interested in providing guidance/advice in planning to ensure the event reflects the interests of community. Community representative, Mary Cameron advised she is happy to support this but noted she has limited availability.
- Shweta Dakin (GenWest) highlighted that a short film featuring Maribyrnong community experiences is being screened at the Melbourne International Film Festival and noted this could also be presented at the anniversary or another event.

Public art project

- On 14 July, a workshop was held to capture community perspectives and sentiment to shape the public art project and inform the concept plan.
 - Feedback from this workshop was that the artwork should convey a sentiment of strength, connectedness and community that came following the flood, as opposed to focusing solely on the flood.
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- A follow up meeting is scheduled for 11 August to provide final feedback on the latest version of the concept plan developed after the workshop. Members were encouraged to attend.

Audio-visual project

- Filming and recording has begun for the audio-visual project, with 9 interviews confirmed. Some have taken place already.
- The Chair asked if members are comfortable with the upcoming CRC meeting in August being filmed for the project. Members expressed support.
- Members were also asked if they would like to participate in a short interview to share their learnings as a CRC member prior to the meeting. Members were happy to support this.

Children's story building project

- The Recovery team are liaising with the families of the young authors to plan a launch event in October. This will be scheduled for 14 October at the Maribyrnong library.

Proposed exhibition

- Council's Creative Communities team have proposed an exhibition of the work of Anna Kiparis, a photographer who took images of the aftermath of the Maribyrnong River Flood. Anna submitted a proposal for the audio-visual project contract and was not successful.
- The Creative Communities team suggested a separate exhibition at the Footscray town hall to feature Anna's work. They can contribute \$5,000 but would require co-contribution through the Community Recovery Hubs Grant.
- The Chair asked the community representatives for their views on the proposal. Members discussed the idea and noted that many within the community want to look forward, not backwards. This exhibition would have the potential to conjure unwanted and painful memories for community.
- Mary Cameron was the community representative on the audio-visual project assessment panel. She highlighted that Anna's photography would make a powerful exhibition.
- Members agreed to view example images of Anna's photography before making a recommendation on whether her work is supported through the grant.
- **Action:** Council to request photos of Anna's photography to share with the CRC

Advocacy update

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- Council representatives have met with seven Ministers and Shadow Ministers across a range of portfolios to discuss the advocacy asks.
 - Letters have been sent to 11 additional Members of Parliament requesting a meeting.
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Recovery planning and learnings

Reflect on learnings for Recovery Plan appendix

Members were asked to reflect on their learnings based on their roles as CRC members. Learnings identified include:

- What helped the CRC to be effective?
 - Independent Chair
 - Dedicated recovery staff
 - Foundation of trust
 - Time: community needs time to heal
 - Recovery funding
 - Learning who does what at Council
 - What made the work harder than it needed to be?
 - Different agendas
 - Fractured start to relationship between Council and the community
 - CRC should have been more diverse
 - Pressure to make decisions without information
 - What surprised you?
 - The generosity of support roles and mentoring by Chair and recovery staff
 - Commitment of community representatives
 - What would you never do again?
 - Try to deliver social connection opportunities when the community still have practical needs
 - Take so much time to establish a CRC
 - Use a different model to seek CRC representatives from community, focused less on experience and more on their capacity to engage with community
 - What would you do every time?
 - Provide practical support (boots on the ground) and be visible in the community
 - Coordinate volunteers and practical supports
 - Connect with existing community and social groups to build trust
 - Start a CRC quickly and resource it well
 - Involve agencies and recovery service providers
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- Use a co-design and community-led model for the program
 - Focus on collecting data early on to quantify the impact
 - Ensure the right people are around the CRC table
 - Establish clear communication channels
 - Engage an Independent Chair
 - Engage recovery staff and a Flood Recovery Manager
 - More team building activities for the CRC
 - Provide more written material for members to review at meetings
 - Provide resources for community to show they live in the area when driving through road closures

Feedback on Maribyrnong Community Flood Plan

Members made additions to the draft Maribyrnong Community Flood Plan using post-it notes. The plan will be revised further with the Maribyrnong Neighbourhood Flood Network.

Learning-sharing

The Chair advised that Andrew Monteiro had participated in a panel discussion at a recent DisasterWISE meeting. She advised there are similar requests from other organisations and networks, including the Department of Premier and Cabinet in Tasmania. CRC member, Paul Larsen, advised he would be happy to support a presentation to share their learnings.

Action: Council to liaise with members to prepare a learning-sharing presentation

Key messages

Members identified the following key messages to share amongst their networks:

- WestJustice is trialling a pop-up clinic for insurance and tenancy support at the Maribyrnong Community Centre (weekly until end September);
- Property flood risk cards will be shared at the end of the month via a door knock and officially launched at a community barbeque in September;
- Advocacy update: the identified advocacy asks continue to be shared with relevant Ministers and their staff; and
- Community are invited to participate in an interview to share their stories and experiences to create a series of short films capturing the Maribyrnong community's experiences following the 2022 flood.
